Mallory Park

The weekend at Mallory Park was overshadowed by a serious accident. It felt particularly unnecessary, as it was caused by cones placed too tightly after the finish line to slow cars down. Our thoughts are with the kind and spirited Welsh competitor involved, and we all wish her a full recovery and hope to see her back next season.

Because of the incident, Saturday was cut short after just one run, with the ambulance leaving the circuit. The missed runs were squeezed into Sunday's schedule, which made for a busy day. On a personal note, I was pleased with my performance, improving by three seconds compared with my time here last year. The car felt superb, holding an incredible 3G of lateral grip around Gerrards with no hint of sliding. That effort earned me a 4th place, two 3rds, and a 2nd.

Rising star Steve Broughton had mechanical trouble when his transfer gear broke, but he bounced back strongly on Sunday to take victories and keep the championship fight alive with Pete. Meanwhile, fellow contender Chris Jones was absent after being sidelined with covid.

Unfortunately, the crashes didn't stop there. My friend Martin had a heavy impact at the hairpin on Sunday, spinning into the barriers and suffering broken ribs. Thankfully, he and his car are

Seeing these incidents, along with another spinal injury in a separate hillclimb event that same weekend, made me reflect on safety. I decided to invest in a much safer seat to reduce risk in case of an accident. ProSeat in Taunton created a custom-fitted seat for me — an impressive two-day process involving careful moulding, resin setting, and adjustments. I'll continue fine-tuning it for comfort before it's finished with suede later in the season.

The extra downforce mods I had created to feed more air to the floor had a knock on effect of diverting air from cooling. An attempt to improve this saw me opening up the rear exit ducts as above. This helps for events up to 80 seconds but is still an issue for longer runs such as Kirkistown.

At Lydden Hill, Steve Broughton was unstoppable, taking two wins. Pete Goulding's rare trip into the gravel didn't help his championship hopes. For me, it was a frustrating outing — I managed a 3rd and a 6th, but I just couldn't find the pace I wanted.

The following week, I switched gears from racing to photography. I spent six days covering the IMechE's global Formula Student competition at Williams F1 and Silverstone. As always, it was inspiring to capture and witness the determination, teamwork, and creativity of the next generation of engineers.

By the early hours, the winds were battering us, and I found myself outside at 2 a.m. removing my windscreen cover before it tore off. By 5 a.m., the buffeting was fierce, and we hit the road to beat the storm back to England. Quite exciting really

A new fuel pump was fitted, but pressure issues pointed to a faulty regulator. Thanks to support from SBD, we diagnosed the problem and rebuilt everything and the loom was tidied up locally by Level Motorsport enroute in South Wales in time for a club meeting/test at Llandow.

While the rest of the country was shivering under cloud, we enjoyed 29°C heat and blue skies all day.

It turned into a valuable development session. After each run, I sent data logs back to SBD, who made adjustments to the engine mapping and gearbox control. By the final run, we'd even trialled an improved system for managing launch and traction phases — a success that should benefit other drivers in future. I drove solidly but carefully, finishing 2nd overall behind a great performance from Phil Montgomery-Smith in his supercharged OMS.





With that done, the car has been quickly prepped for Carfest, where I'll be driving in front of 90,000 people across three days. Sharing the stage with historic F1 cars, modern supercars, and classics at Jody Scheckter's private track promises to be another great weekend – let alone the music and celeb spotting. After that, we are off to the French Alps for



walking/relaxing, gearing up for a trek later this year in the Patagonian Andes.

Because of these commitments, I'll miss four championship rounds at Snetterton, so this will be the last time I can say I'm sitting in 2nd place!
